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

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Rowdie Racing News

Rowdie Racing was pretty quiet in 2006. With many family and work demands, # 49 sat in the garage until rolled out for Watkins Glen 2006. This was a must participate event as we were lucky enough to win the Bucher-Decker Cup for first MGA in 2005. I felt the need to go and try to defend the

cup this year. On Friday the car was running well, but the driver was rusty. The lack of seat time had taken it's toll, not to mention Father Time clicking in another lap on the Age-O-Meter. On Saturday, it was apparent that several of the cars were much faster this year, and only a miracle would keep us in the chase for the cup.

This year we had a new paddock, which was paved, and in the company of Joe Tierno and Dick Powers. Chari's new right knee was working great, and gave her mobility to climb in grandstands and walk over to the false grid. The weather was near perfect with sunny 70's in the day and crisp 60's at night with clear skies. In the evenings we went out to dinner with crew chief Mark Barnhart and crew Jose Tapia. As usual both guys worked diligently to keep # 49 in top running order. All weekend, it was noticed that # 49 was always "ready to go" started cleanly and was quite quick. Many of the other cars were "hoods up" when not on the track. However we do not get smug, as the dark side of the force can beset us too, as it did in 2005. The Friday night trip downtown was a huge event with 40-50 thousand people in the village. The 150 race cars in the recreation

event always draw a lot of interest. This year, the engines fired off, but the group did not pull out. We soon learned that a lady had fallen from a Pre-War car that had cut away doors and no seat belts. The accident was quite grim, and the subsequent investigation prevented the recreation


laps. As # 49 was not in the lottery this year, Mark, Chari and I were able to drive the modern iron back to the track. Mark and I were on the patio-roof of the Glen Club when the 150 cars returned to the track at dusk. All of the drivers and passengers were in good cheer, all things considered. We learned later that the lady will have a full recovery. On Saturday morning, Good friend Denny Cornett brought Denver Cornetts 1947 MGTC over to our paddock. He said the tank was full, and he was sure that his dad would want us to enjoy this historic car at this venue, where it first raced in 1948. Denver's health is not the best, and he could not come to the track this year. Otto Linton was also onsite and said that we should take the car around the compound. Mark Barnhart and I immediately got in and drove the entire infield. Literally dozens of people came up and chatted or waved, this is a WELL Known car in racing circles. I also was able to take Chari for a nice ride, and then turned it over to Joe and Bridget Tierno with Denny's permission. This was a Very Special treat, as Denver Cornett is a great friend and fierce competitor. It was our honor to have this rolling display. Sunday is Race Day. The weather was again

perfect. # 29 MGA driven by best buddy Joe Tierno was in row four on the outside. Rowdie Racing # 49 was in row five on the inside. The Collier Cup race was in Prime Time at 11:30 AM. The starter flag station had been moved about 200 yards closer to Turn One to help the NASCAR guys try to get around turn one. This made a big difference in controlling the large field of MGs in the race. The two MGBGT V8s of Les Gonda and Jerry Richards were on the pole and P2. I knew it would be a quick start with 400+ horsepower on tap. When the field was about halfway to the new Starter Stand, I heard the roar of the V-8s. It WAS going to be a quick start. I immediately punched the trusty 1622 to 7700 rpm in second and again in third. At that moment, the inside cars in row Four and Three both moved further inside. This left a small opening up the middle. I pulled fourth gear and moved up to Row three on the Start. Careful not to overcook Turn One on still cold tires, I was able to hold this position, and head off to the Climbing Esses. This is the same spot where the Big NASCAR wreck occurred this year. Threading thru the traffic, I checked all gauges and was in P1 for the Bucher-Decker Cup. After About four laps, I saw Joe Tierno's MGA go into my draft. This allowed him to close up, and then late brake into the inner loop. As He had made the pass, I dropped into P2 for the rest of the race. Joe's car in 1959 had been driven by Bob Bucher, and won the Collier race that year against his best friend Sherm Decker. Deja Vu all over again.

On the cool off lap, I followed Joe into the false grid, and saw Jack Whoerly point Joe into Victory Lane. I was very happy for Joe, as he drove a great race. Then Jack was pointing # 49 into Victory Circle. At First I

thought it was a mistake, but Jack was quite emphatic that I turn right. I pulled into Victory Circle behind Joe and Manley Ford pulled in with his MGTC. Then I realized that the only award remaining was the Collier Cup. Bill Green, Track Historian and Mark Barnhart ran up, and began congratulations. Soon Joe Tierno and his wife Bridget and my wife Chari were also in the group.



The awards ceremony was a blur, and both Joe and I were very emotional to receive the Bucher Decker and the Collier Cup in the same year. As we are also both Jake's Stable cars; named after Bob Bucher. That only added to the moment. After the track ceremony, Joe and I were interviewed on television. This will be part of a special telecast in New York State. The crew said that we would get a complementary copy.

As Joe and I were too charged up to leave, we hung around for the Group 1 race at 5:00 PM. By this time, the 1622 was really showing her age. I have been running this engine for over five years and in well over 100 races. It has been a great five years, and the engine

ran well, all things considered. Joe and I were able to toss the cars into a controlled drift thru the corners, which is always the best feeling in motorsports.

After that race, we had calmed a bit, and decided to celebrate at Seneca Lodge. This is where ALL the legendary drivers went after the US Grand Prix races. The walls are loaded with Garlands, and other memorabilia from the 50's and 60's. There is also a lot of modern era NASCAR stuff too. Just to go here on Sunday night is something an MG owner needs to experience. We soon decided that the cups were an excellent vessel from which to consume beer. In fact MANY people decided that this was the intended use of the cup. It was a great week of racing and a great way to wrap it up.






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
