Lots of us Y owners graced shows and tours around the country this last year. As we near the end of the year I thought it would be good to look back at some of the Y Type events we've all attended in the last 12 months. We start traditionally at the Spring Run in May.



SEAT RUNNERS

You may recall that earlier in the year I wrote about some owners' vain searches for replacement seat runners (the channel which is fitted to the floor). We have now heard from our friend Paul Barrow of the International Website. He wrote:

'Many people have bemoaned the fact that their floor mounted seat runners (for driver and passenger seats Y and YB and driver seat for YT) have either cracked, split, broken or are simply missing from their cars, and so they are not able to adjust their seats backwards and forwards and lock them in place or even easily remove them. Quite simply they have net been available from any MG parts supplier and no one has been prepared to make up the tooling to make them before now.

Well... I have decided to change that, and YZ Publications has now had the tooling made and these will soon be available again. At this time, I do not have a final supplied cost price, so what I am looking for, please, is expressions of interest.

These will be available individually. A full Y/

YB set therefore will be a set of four, the YT a set of two

I won't hold you to a final request but i am trying to assess how many to make in the first batch. The cost will however I am sure be reasonable. Shipping will always be a variable but then that will only be at market cost."
