A road trip to Europe

2022 is the 75th anniversary of the MG Y Type saloon and tourer. To mark the occasion a Y Type owner based in Epe, Netherlands had organised a Y Type gathering for Sunday 8th May 2022. The opportunity of a tour was too hard to resist for me and my regular navigator, so here is report of our adventure.



Tuesday 3rd May, we set off early at 5am and decided to take M27 east bound and follow the coast road towards Folkstone. We had driven just over 2 hours and were east of Brighton, close to Newhaven on the A27 when we pulled in to large lay-by for leg stretch and to find some cover from a hedge row to help irrigate the local flora. By around 7-30 the traffic had picked up a bit and we were due to resume our journey but as I pulled on the starter knob there was no response, the engine was dead with nil turnover. After an hour spent trying to sort out the problem, I conceded that the best option was call to the RAC and they quickly diagnosed that the battery was at fault as the dynamo was not supplying sufficient a charge to keep it topped up. The fact was that for first time in long while I had driven for 2 hours with head lights on and this had highlighted an underlying problem. Thanks to modern technology, a quick google search and two mobile phone calls, d was able to establish that Curd Brothers in Tunbridge Wells were able to look at and hopefully sort the problem. The trouble

was that they were approximately 40 miles from where we were stuck. Thankfully the superb RAC breakdown driver was only too happy to assist and follow me all the way to Curd Brothers with a couple stop for a top-up charge along the way. After we arrived at Curd Brothers a quick examination found that the brushes were stuck in the dynamo and the regulator was faulty. Less than 2 hours later, we were back on the road and heading towards Folkestone again.

We arrived at the Eurotunnel and crossed over to Calais, then headed for our first campsite at Ypres without further issue or delay. We pitched our tents and put the YB inside a farmyard outbuilding for a dry covered park up.



Wednesday 4th May we paid a visit to Ypres.

Thursday 5th May we visited Brugge using the train.

<u>Friday 6th May</u>, another early rise, and journey to Epe. We had last minute change of plan to the scheduled route as I had planned to go to the North West part of Netherlands to visit another Y Type owner. However, having re-visited the distance on google maps and restudied the ap, it was jointly decided this was a step too far for one day. So, we headed to Epe a day earlier than planned and had a long journey crossing over the border from Belgium into the Netherlands



with an all-day drive and with the last hour on the motorway to ensure arrival in Epe before dusk.

<u>Saturday 7th May</u>, in the town of Epe there was local Classic Car and Spring Music event with live bands, which I was told was organised by the local retailers. The town was full of people and there was a large mix of car marques on display. The sun was shining and it was fantastic day with two Ys on display and my car being the only UK registered vehicle at the show.



<u>Sunday 8th May</u>, there was a gathering of 12 Y types in total, which is a truly superb gathering for an event held in mainland Europe. There were some superb cars on display and the MG car Club of Holland had provided sponsorship for the event. There was some nice cake and champagne to help us all celebrate this remarkable event. The hosts and their fellow guests all spoke superb English and made us most welcome.



<u>Monday 9th May</u> we left at roughly 9-30 for a trip to Arnhem, where we were due to stay on a campsite at a working farm in Doorwerth. For no other reason other than because I could, I decided I wanted to cross the border into Germany, simply to add another country to the list of countries we had visited. We planned a slight de-tour to our route and crossed the border. We filled up with fuel and had a cake stop at town called Vreden. We then drove back into the Netherlands and en-route to Arnhem stopped at a car sales showroom gallery called Gallery Aaldering <u>https://www.gallery-aaldering.com/</u> There were 4 or 5 floors ram packed with some very exotic 6 figure priced vehicles. We only stayed for brief flash review as we had been on road for bit and were keen to get to our campsite. But if there were more time, one



could easily have stayed for longer and enjoyed a cup of tea or coffee at the café on site. On arrival we pitched our tents and again I parked my YB inside a farmyard outbuilding. The farmer moved their large combine harvester to allow space for YB to undercover in a secure area.

Tuesday 10th May we had day trip in Arnhem

<u>Wednesday 11th May</u>, we drove from Arnhem to Ypres and then returned back to the campsite. It was very hot in the mid-20s and a mixture of rural and more urban driving. Despite built-up slow-moving traffic around Mechelen in Belgium, we got to Ypres without any problems.

<u>Thursday 11th May</u> was the last day of the trip. Having camped for 9 nights and 10 days away, this was the only time we had rain, which was overnight. However, the tents were kept relatively dry by the wind and we were up at 5am. Away by 6am, we took main roads, N roads and the A16 to Coquelles for the channel tunnel journey home. We managed to get on the 08-20am crossing arriving back in Blighty at 07-55 UK time.



As we drove back towards Hampshire, I discovered that a fuse had blown. I had no fuel gauge or rear lights. This had happened previously on my trip to Western Isles of Hebrides in 2020. I re-fitted a spare fuse and we soon stopped for full-monty breakfast at a place called the Village Shop and Café at Etchingham, East Sussex.

We eventually arrived home at 1-30pm, just after my YT had arrived home from a wedding duty. (Ed. As reported in the last newsletter). This completed the trip and the total mileage was 1019 miles, with only overnight rainfall throughout the 10-day trip. Another very successful journey in my 1952 MG YB. I can bet that the workers at Abingdon back in the 50s would never have envisaged the humble Y Type going on such a journey in 2022 and beyond. Here is to many more years of happy motoring in what surely is truly green car, compared to today's more throw away modern cars that last perhaps 10 to 15 years before they are scrapped.
