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

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Chairman's Chatter by Gordie Bird This month, I'll be taking the Chatter 'on the road'. We've planned a 4-day

1000-mile trip to Gatlinburg for MG2006 and it might be fun to chronicle the adventure as it unfolds. Since it was decent weather when we left, Steve & Cathy Holliday joined us in their '58 1500 and left the BGT in the garage.

Sunday the weather report was for an increasing chance of showers with rain in Michigan for sure. Pulled out at 8:30am and figured we could outrun the rain. We did, but it was mighty hot. Traveling east on 250 in Ohio, we were looking for a likely spot for lunch. It took 2 hours before we finally saw a restaurant with a beer sign. Turns out this watering hole was the local VFW (Army-Navy Garrison in Ohio) and one must be a member to enter and imbibe. Well, we were hot, thirsty, and hungry, and after all, I am a veteran. We banged on the door until it was answered and pleaded our case. The door closed and I think they had a vote of the members present because pretty soon the door opened and we were welcomed in. The pitchers of beer were \$4 and the good size burgers were \$1. A huge pile of fries was fifty cents! They said if we left a card we could get in again. We gave them several cards. We covered 300 uneventful miles with both cars running well. I did manage to jam my bonnet down at a gas stop. Fortunately I had done this before and had the solution. Arrived in Saint Clairsville, Ohio thankful to have an air-conditioned room.

Monday morning dawned overcast with occasional showers. The rule is: If it's not raining when we start, the hoods stay down. Well, it was pouring by the time we left, so hoods were erected. Fortunately the rain only lasted a couple of hours, and although still threatening rain, we had to put the hood back down. Drove some great roads. If you ever have the opportunity, take 800 from Fly, Ohio (on the river) anywhere north. SR 255 is another one that is a great drive, although it could use a resurfacing. If you like country music, just

south of Saint Clairsville is the Jamboree in the Hills, billed as the Superbowl of country music. After crossing the Ohio River via ferry at Fly (a tradition), we took some local roads, SR 16 and SR 5, both of which are great driving roads. We saw a bit of commotion with a semi stopped and cars lined up behind. Seems this truck couldn't quite negotiate the tight corner and chewed up ½ of a telephone pole. Lunchtime once again found us in search of a suitable venue, and upon guerying one of the locals in Glenville, WV, discovered the only place in the area was a hotel restaurant that was right on our way. The lounge was closed, but the staff was only more than happy to open it for us. Started to rain just before we were ready to leave, so delayed a few minutes. It was just sprinkling and so we left with top down and in only a few miles the rain had stopped, and it didn't start the rest of the day. One disappointment was WV route 19 as it was expressway-like, to Beckley. We arrived in Bluefield, WV without incident. We were somewhat shocked to walk into the bar and see about 15 couples on the dance floor. Problem was there was no music! Turned out to be a dance class. Steve was offered a free lesson but declined.

Tuesday June 20 dawned bright and sunny, although weather called for increasing chance of rain. We could see the clouds coming and had to get going to beat them. Pulled out of Bluefield just in time as the drops began falling. Stopped a while later and saw the clouds still trying to catch up, so pressed on. Stopped for lunch, and once again the clouds kept trying to overtake us. Finally after lunch, and on the Blue Ridge Parkway the clouds were nowhere to be seen. Beautiful drive on the Parkway, elevation to nearly 6000 ft and some incredible scenery. Met up with displaced Rowdies Brad & Kathy Dryden (Atlanta) in Asheville. The Dryden's arrived first and had the beer iced by the time we arrived. The temperature in Ashville was mid 80's upon arrival, which was quite a shock as it was considerably cooler driving in the mountains. Traveling the mountains is interesting. Going up hill, we have a hard time keeping up with more modern iron, but going downhill we catch up to all of them. We've traveled some great driving roads, both on and off the Blue Ridge Parkway. Not far from arrival in Asheville, my trusty 30-year-old Ray-Ban sunglasses broke at the frame, so I was out sunglasses.

Tuesday evening we all had a great dinner at the East


Village Grill, where we met Nick, the owner and self avowed "car guy". English beer and good food and company. We recommend the East Village Grill, located at US 70 and Blue Ridge Pkwy. As we were leaving, in pulled 3 more MGAs. We'd run across a Connecticut contingent making their way to Gatlinburg. After chatting for a while, they went in for dinner and we all were looking forward to the remainder of the drive to Gatlinburg. I needed some sunglasses and found some \$1 pairs at a local store. Not being able to decide which looked best, I bought 4 pair. The group got me to model each pair and made a decision for me on which to wear. After a swim and a few more beers we retired to prepare for the final leg into Gatlinburg and the Tail of the Dragon.

Wednesday June 21. Weather is supposed to be good with only a 20% change of isolated thundershowers. Off to Gatlinburg with 870 miles under our belt and about 200 to go. Shortly after entering the Blue Ridge Parkway we came upon our Connecticut friends so we stopped for chatting and some photo ops on this beautiful overlook. Always looking for the best place for a photo, I spotted this rock ledge across the street that looked about 10' high. As I started to climb, I realized it was closer to 20' up and the first 15' was a pretty sheer rock face. Not wanting to look stupid by turning around and going back, I proceeded to be stupid and climb. I've never rock climbed, but I did stay at a Holiday Inn Express, so off I went. I

made it, got the shot, but lost my reading glasses on the way. A few miles down the parkway was route WV rte 276, an incredible road down the side of the mountain. The park at the bottom (and the reason for the side trip) had a beautiful falls and a natural sliding rock. Yes, a 60' rock smooth enough to slide down and into a deep pool. I wanted to so bad, but the climbing incident was fresh in my mind, and the temp (air) was in the low 60's, so I passed. The falls were breathtaking and after sufficient photos off we went back up the mountain to the parkway. The Blue Ridge Parkway south of Ashville is absolutely stunning. We were up and down continuously and finally reached the highest elevation of 6053'. As I was looking forward to the driving the Tail of the Dragon, I saw a sign that said Gatlinburg, 15 miles. Hmmm, must have taken a wrong turn somewhere. I glanced at my odometer and saw we had exceeded 1000 miles, so in to Gatlinburg we went. We'd have to do the Dragon another day. We arrived at the Glenstone Lodge with all cars and people intact about 2pm on Wednesday.

That was the trip to MG2006, and a great drive it was. I'll leave the story of Gatlinburg to someone else. Have you taken a trip in your MG lately? Why not write an article and share it with all of us? Until the next adventure.





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
