I hope everyone likes their calendar. Since this is the first time this club has done this. we'd like to get your feedback as we are planning on doing another year. 

Aquatic Bidders

The following article is reprinted from the Columbia Gorge MGA Club June 2007 newsletter, by Keith Ansell, Club President.

We have had the MG out a few times now with the top down and IT IS WONDERFUL! Have you been out in your car? Hope you are enjoying driving your car and this thought brought to mind an event many years ago as I was standing in front of the counter at one of the British car shops in town. The customer standing be-



sides me was complaining about how expensive it was to buy parts and keep his MG on the road. He was buying the clutch components for his MGB and it came to about \$140.00. Well I had just finished putting a clutch in a Porsche 944 a few days before and I had paid about \$600.00 for basically the same parts! So this month I want to expand on how inexpensive our toys are compared to almost anything else out there, old or new!

First scenario: "My MG is just to expensive to drive, I'm going to sell it and buy a new car" (Usually a Miata). First part, do the math: Watcha' gonna pay for that new ride? \$30,000.00 plus I'll betcha! Now the payments will be about \$300.00 per month. If you put \$300.00 per month in your MG you would have an absolutely beautiful car in less than a couple years. It wouldn't be just another "whatever" you chose, it would be unique and one of the best. As you put money into a new car with monthly payments the car becomes worth LESS, yep, it's called depreciation and most cars lose about 50% of their value in three years AS you put more of your hard earned money into it! Oh, yeh forgot to mention that a large part of your payment is interest. Your MG gets more valuable each year if you ONLY maintain it at the level you started with and I'll guarantee the monthly cost will be much less than payments on that new car. Spruce up that great little British car and you'll get most of your money back if you ever want to sell it (don't sell it, you'll regret it!).

Second scenario: The cost of keeping it on the road is just too much. First is that we have to remember that your car is at least 27 years old, my MGA just had it's 45th birthday! If your car hasn't been maintained at peak levels for all these years you probably have some making up/ repairing to do. I usually say it takes me 4 years of driving a used car to get it wrung out and the bugs chased out. Honest shops that specialize in our cars will make sure that your car is tiptop if you give them the chance. It's probably gonna cost you the "monthly payment for a new car" for a while until you get caught up. But remember your car gets more valuable as time passes getting some of that money back! As you put those "monthly payments" into the car it will become more reliable and more fun. Today we even can add modern electronic ignition, better brakes, fancy 5 speed gearboxes and many other new things. Then our cars will be even more dependable than they are now. Also did

you notice that petrol/gasoline is now over \$3.50 a gallon? Remember that if your MG is getting under 20 Miles Per Gallon something is wrong and a good running MGB with overdrive will get 35+ Mpg, an MGA will easily get high 20's! Better than many cars today. That sure helps you want to go for a drive. Last and definitely not least is the simplicity of our cars allows us to actually do some of the work on our cars if we want to. I think of myself as a mechanic but can't even do more than change the spark plugs, filters and oil on our new Volvo, it has to go to the shop for simply resetting the "check Engine" light because someone didn't get the gas cap on right, \$40.00 gone! Try the 60.000 mile timing belt change at home, NOT, oh yeh, another \$400.00 down the drain.

Third scenario: Parts aren't available and are way too expensive. Bought a gas cap for your Honda lately, about \$28.00, MGA \$14.95, MGB about the same. Remember the clutch for the Porsche? \$600.00 but \$149.95 for the MGB. TR-6 prices are about the same. We can build a complete NEW MGB roadster or GT today with a complete new body! Cost of the body, about \$9,000.00 or one third the cost of a new car! It may take a week to get some parts from a local dealer or overnight if you pay shipping but we can get almost everything for our cars. It won't be a Shucks or AutoZone store but your local shop knows where to get the good stuff. And it's Not expensive compared to parts for a newer car!

MG as a daily driver, you bet! And it's fun too! And it's worth more every year! I don't need any more input, so let's go drive that great Little British Car!

Your chance to travel down memory lane I would like to thank John Twist for sending me his stash of back-issues, which included two issues I have been searching for to complete my set.

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Tech Tips

Winding Road recently needed to transport the Mitsubishi Lancer Evo VIII for this month's sedan comparison to our road test site in Texas. As a result, we faced the dilemma that many eBay buyers, buyers of classic or rare cars, and occasional racers face: How do I get the car from here to there if I can't drive it myself? We've done this before of course, but sometimes the truck and driver who showed up didn't exactly inspire confidence, shall we say. With this in mind, we were pleased to find that FedEx now offers a service it calls Custom Critical Passport Auto Transport. Ever curious about new and better ways to do things, we decided to give it a go.

The first part of the experience went impressively well. We found the Custom Critical page of the FedEx Web site, entered the ZIP code where the car was located, the ZIP code where the car was going, when we wanted the car picked up, and then had to designate enclosed or open transport. With valuable cars, enclosed transport feels better, so we chose that approach and clicked the "Get a quote" button. The site immediately generated a quote of \$1,366, and showed that the cost of enclosed transport was only \$350 more than the open transport option. A small price for the peace of mind it provides.

It seemed almost too easy. When we got our confirmation via e-mail, we found that FedEx would contact us with the actual pickup date range. About a day later, someone did, and then contacted our pick-up representative with the exact day and time, which turned out to be 10 days after we sent in the order. Not bad, especially considering that the car was in southwestern Colorado, 400 miles from the nearest large city and 1,100 miles from the destination. The driver called to confirm pickup and arranged a pickup point. (With a semi, you have to have a relatively flat and large area for pickup and drop off.) When the driver arrived, we were very impressed by the truck. Basically built like a race transporter without the tools, the FedEx truck was absolutely pristine inside and out. The driver told us he'd make it to the destination in about a week. FedEx then sent us an e-mail with the delivery date range (5-10 days out), and then called us seven days and two days in advance of the exact date. The driver called the day of delivery and we gave him directions to a drop-off point. Our drop-off spot was in front of an office building (Ann Arbor, MI). When the truck arrived, the driver had to take a Lamborghini Gallardo off first, and, as soon as the Lambo was on the ground, our delivery became the day's entertainment for some of the office workers. People came out, inspected the cars (in addition to the Gallardo, a '56 Corvette and a '57 MG), and looked over the truck. Total elapsed time from going to the FedEx Web site to the drop off of the car was 18 days, which undoubtedly varies with the pickup and drop-off points. We were pleased with the care exhibited by the driver and impressed with the protection of the cars (all of them were wrapped in protective plastic, with covers on the seats and floors). What we liked even better was that the process was simple, and things happened exactly as FedEx said they would.

Handy Shop Tools Reprinted from the RC Report by Tony Vlasak Submitted by Neil Griffin

Drill press: a tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching

the parts from your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, splattering it against a freshly painted fender.

Wire wheel: a tool that cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench. It also removes fingerprints and calluses in about the time it takes to say, "Ow!"

Electric hand drill: a tool frequently used for spinning pop rivets in their holes until they get so hot they melt.

Pliers: a tool used to round off hexagonal bolt heads.

Oxyacetylene torch: a tool used almost exclusively for setting varibus flammable objects in your shop on fire. Also handy for igniting the oil inside a engine crankcase from which you're trying to extract a bearing.

Whitworth sockets: once used for working on older British cars and motorcycles, they're now used mainly as tools we're willing to loan.

Hydraulic floor jack: used for lowering an automobile to the ground after you have installed new brake pads, trapping the jack handle firmly under the bumper. Eight-foot long douglas fir 4x4: useful when attempt to lever an automobile up off a hydraulic floor jack handle.

Tweezers: a tool for removing splinters of wood, especially douglas fir.

Telephone: a tool for calling your neighbor to see if he has another hydraulic floor jack.

Gasket scraper: theoretically made for scraping, most often used for spreading mayonnaise on a work-shop sandwich.

1/2x16" flat-blade screwdriver: a large prying tool that inexplicably has an accurately machined screwdriver tip on the end opposite the handle.

Aviation metal snips: see hacksaw.


