

meet. See you there. Happy New Year.





Movie Review-"Two For The Road"-Ken Nelson

Any Audrey Hepburn or Albert Finney fans out there will undoubtedly have seen this trilogy film made in 1967. It is a romancecomedy-drama of two people at 3 stages in their life and relationship; initially as penniless students traveling through France, next as impoverished newlyweds driving their MG-TD on a honeymoon trip through France, and finally ending as a rich middleaged couple with grown-up kids traveling in an expensive Mercedes through France.

Along the way they encounter quite a few bumps in the road, as well as in their relationship, and the movie traces the development of that relationship including both the good and the bad. All in all, the human side of the story is both interesting and believable; lots of people today go through many of the same ups and downs, and the outcome is never assured or certain. The acting by both Finney and Hepburn is outstanding. He is a wonderfully selfconfident, cocky, cynical, self-absorbed individual, and Audrey Hepburn is, well, Audrey Hepburn. The scene of her imitating a crossing signal is a classic, and she is charming, innocent, delightful, and beautifully alluring all at once throughout the movie. Can you tell I'm a bit of a Hepburn fan here?

Well, on to the good stuff, because as the owner of a dark green MG-TD, you'll be able to get an idea as to another reason I can relate to this movie. The car is featured rather prominently in the second section of the movie, and I certainly enjoyed seeing "my" TD being put through its paces. I wish I could state that "no cars were harmed during the making of this movie" but I'm fairly certain I would be lying. For me, I think that is what also added the element of Shakespearean tragedy to the story line. In 1967 I suppose the expense to the filmmakers was a drop in the bucket, and this was long before the era of realistic digital effects.

So, as in life, there is a bit of pathos as well as happiness in the story. I'd recommend this as an excellent movie that will impress your wife or girlfriend will how "in-touch" you have become with that inner feminine side you never like to show. Silicone Brake Fluid

From Dave Quinn: "I came across this on the web. Appears to be an excellent summary on Silicone Brake Fluid."

Silicone Brake Fluid Strengths and Weakness

Strengths:

1) It has a high boiling point since it does not absorb water. Therefore, there's no so-called wet boiling point.

2) Doesn't absorb moisture.

3) Doesn't remove paint.

4) The viscosity is more stable over the extremes of temperature.

5) With the exception of some formulations used in external boots, silicone brake fluid is compatible with all standard brake components.

Drawbacks:

1) It's hard to pour without entraining air bubbles--hence an application will generally have a softer, spongier pedal feel.

2) It doesn't absorb water, so any water already in the system accumulates in the lowest point of the system and stays there, causing rust.

3) Glycol fluids begin to compress near their boiling points, whereas silicone fluids begin to compress at around 300-350 degrees Fahrenheit.

4) Additives in the fluid can vaporize at comparatively moderate temperature, increasing the spongy feel.

5) Silicone fluids expand significantly when hot.

6) Silicone fluid is functionally incompatible with systems that have held glycol-based fluids for any length of time, requiring flushing and seal replacement (there are counter opinions on this, which state that the modern silicone formulations are in fact compatible with only a flushing, rather than a complete reseal). The actual DOT specification requires chemical compatibility, so as far as that goes, the two fluids won't cause reactions if used in the same system, but they certainly won't mix, either.

7) It's pretty much incompatible with anti-lock brakes because the silicone fluids tend to be more viscous, which can cause problems with the timing of the pulses that are intended to work with the thinner glycolbase fluid. This sometimes leads to damage of the ABS valving. The rapid pulsing necessary to anti-lock functions tend to cavitate the fluid, as the tiny bubbles collapse and coalesce into larger ones, and then collapse and reform into smaller ones. This tends to counteract the ABS effect and can diminish the actual effective braking. This condition also heats the fluid and can lead to even more sponginess and possible damage to the ABS controller. Thirdly, silicone brake fluid tends to foam when expressed from a small orifice under pressure, reducing its hydraulic effectiveness greatly.

Ever try to change your steering wheel? For the first 31 years of ownership of my MGA I studiously avoided taking the steering wheel off the steering column of my car. Once I discovered that I could easily remove the adjustable column extension (remove the pinch bolt and collar at the dash and then pop out the locking key at the side and it slides right out) with the steering wheel still attached, I gave up even trying to take the wheel off the shaft. I painted and added a leather cover to the original steering wheel this way. But I finally decided that I wanted to try a fancy Moto-Lita type wood and aluminum wheel on for size. I had easily a voided this for 31 years due to the price of

to 1 1/4" size. So I had to hunt around in the 3/4" drive socket catalog and they get a bit pricey. Harbor Freight came to the rescue finally with an 8-piece 3/4" impact socket set from 1" to 1 1/2" in 1/16" increments for only \$26.95 (item #02561) and a 3-piece 1/2" to 3/4" adapter kit for \$4.99 (item # 02117). A *single* socket from S-K would cost that much or more, so this complete set was a bargain.

When I tried the nut (which was undoubtedly placed there 53 years ago at the factory) I got ready for a struggle. But a 3/4" socket can provide a whole lot of torque, and it came off easily. Then I looked at the tiny little splines holding the wheel on, and found I had no way to pull this loose. But when I removed the wheel and extension shaft together, I found that a light tap with a hammer and piece of wood popped the shaft loose easily also. What a deal! Plus, the new wheel slipped right on and tightened up easily. I was impressed!

But, how would it feel? Well, I'm here to tell you it feels like one nicely made and good fitting wheel. So far I'm enjoying it more than I thought I would. Steering requires a bit more effort with the smaller wheel, but it also feels "tighter" on the road and quite pleasant so far. So if you have a steering wheel change coming up in your life, you might check out Watford Classic Cars on the internet, and Harbor Freight for some cost-effective larger sockets. But I'm going to continue to keep the same "nut" behind the wheel of my MGA, even though Kathy does say he drives like a maniac at times!
